 - Applications and trends





Agencies indicate a wide range of devices in use for public safety



Current smart device uses by respondents include

- Mobile EMS charting
- CAD/RMS app for law enforcement
- Vehicle, hydrants locations for fire services
- GIS capabilities, providing Common Operating Picture
- SMS text messaging
- Alerts, calls, mapping, e.g., Active 911



Many agencies leverage personal devices to save costs

- Approximately 40% of respondent agencies allow use of personal devices for official use
 - Some offer a stipend when used for business
- Majority of BYOD are smartphones. Laptops and tablets are mostly issued.
- Some agencies more stringent on BYOD in accordance with security protocols and mobile device management policies

Looking Ahead

Emerging trends in smart device use include

- Agencies planning future upgrades towards smart devices, e.g., moving from MDTs to MDCs/laptops or tablets
- Several agencies are developing apps for their organization
- As broadband and public safety applications become more accessible, smart device adoption will continue to grow
- As users, devices and capabilities grow, security and management receive more consideration

Conclusions

- Smart mobile device use for public safety is pervasive in Oregon, performing a wide range of uses
- Use of these devices is increasing, so FirstNet forecasts should include substantial growth
- Local app development for internal agency use is flourishing.
 FirstNet's app ecosystem should be designed to encourage this and make it easier, not harder in the future.
- As use grows, security becomes a concern. FirstNet should maintain its security focus.
- Use of personal devices is prevalent, so FirstNet will need BYOD solutions
